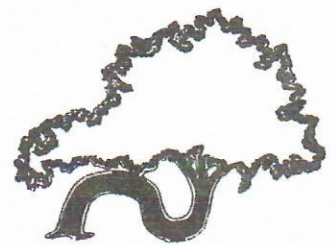

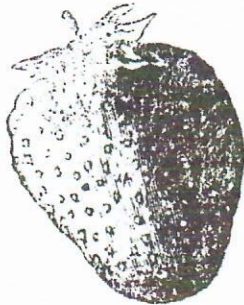

The room also offers children's craft activities, all for a child-sized price of 25 cents.


THINGS WE COULD USE...
