

Union Pacific Car No. 25748 is the 48th caboose in a series of 50 model CA-10 cabooses built by the International Car Co. of Kenton Ohio in 1975. One of the last cupola cabooses built, it served Union Pacific as a general purpose caboose for 22 years before being retired to Swan Island two years ago.

#### Harlow Canyon restored, planted

The canyon area behind the Harlow House is in the capable hands of three different crews racing Mother Nature to complete the restoration project before winter rains.

David Evans and Associates, a public works contractor hired by the City of Troutdale, is providing one crew, as is Multnomah Youth Conservation Job Training, part of the Multnomah Education Service District. Also taking part is a group of high school aged workers from CRUE, Crew Restoring Urban Environment.

The results are apparent. The entire area that flooded behind the Harlow House in 1996 (in the old Harlow fish ponds) has been restored with a catch pool and a meandering stream reinforced with immense cedar logs. Native trees and shrubs have been planted and grass has been seeded.

As part of this restoration, Troutdale Grade School teacher Barb Moritay's fifth graders will monitor plant growth and birds and animals in the canyon. Erosion monitoring is also part of their project. Val Lantz, Troutdale parks director, says it is a great project for students because it is within reasonable walking distance of the school.

Still to be rebuilt is the bridge in the upper canyon. When that is done the trail -- called Robin's Way in honor of Robin Dix and the Dix family whose farm was once at the top --- will be reopened. The project has also allowed us to place the earthen berm to hold the Burns Rest Stop, a bench overlooking the area in memory of Jack Burns of Burns Bros. truck stops.

Len Otto presided. Otto, a former student and also a former teacher at the school, began the meeting with reminiscences about the building. Introductions and stories guickly followed.

Among those teachers remembered, Helen Fehrenbacher was a favorite of all who were in her classes. Crystal Bayley, society member and Troutdale Grade School Teacher for 30 vears. attended and renewed acquaintances with several former students. She and her students recounted many stories as they pored over photos dating from 1946 to 1976.

Society member Bob Dix remembered welcoming new principal Mr. Leslie Bass with a candy and nut shower. According to Dix. Mr. Bass was unaware of this custom and was not particularly happy about being the recipient of one. Bass was also remembered by several former students as having crepe soled shoes so he couldn't be heard as he approached a "naughty" students.

Members attending the reunion were amazed at how much the school has grown. Several began their Troutdale Grade School careers in the old wooden building that was replaced in 1926. On site now are several portable classrooms to contain the ever-increasing school population.

Special thanks to Jan Vandiver for supplying refreshments and festive decorations, to Louise Dix and some mystery cookie bakers who brought treats, and to all those generous Troutdale Grade School "kids" who put money in the hat to help off-set the expense of holding the meeting in the building.
