Pioneer travail: The Sager family, Jan. 18

On Sunday, Jan. 18, 2 p.m., in Troutdale City Hall, the speaker for our January meeting is Lynn Renner of Vancouver, descendant of the Sager family, orphans whose parents died on the Oregon Trail, describes one of the most dramatic stories of the pioneer route.

After the death of their parents, the seven Sager orphans, one an infant, completed passage of the Oregon Trail and were placed in the



care of Marcus and Narcissa Whitman at their mission near the present Walla Walla, Wash. A year later two of the Sager boys died in the Cayuse Indian attack that killed the Whitmans. Alice Wand is in charge.

Deb Cook gathered income and outgo from Harvest Faire and put it in spread sheet form, a satisfying display because it makes us all feel good to see that our efforts yielded a profit of \$4,333.26.

Thanks to sponsors of music and events at the Harlow House -- Reynolds Metals, Walsh & Sons and Handy Bros.-- we even made a bit on music after expenses for a total of \$163.62.

Our raffle tickets through Ali Peret at Historic Columbia River Jewelers yielded \$275 and produced two winners, as well.

Vendor booths made a profit of \$415. Sales and plants and other items in our historical society booth resulted in \$96 in profit. We received donations of \$95. Sadie Riley's kitchen produced \$352.46 and Janet Vandiver's ham dinner earned \$939.24. We collected \$973.73 at the gate in outright "Buck for Barn" gifts and made \$775.65 on pies.

In memory..

Merle M. Coons, a longtime member of our society, died Dec. 16 in Pocatello, Idaho, at the age of 76.

A retired Air Force Colonel, he was born in 1921 in Arlington, growing up in Troutdale and Gresham. He retired from the U.S. Air Force in 1968 after a 26-year career that including 67 combat missions over Europe during World War II. He received the title "Fighter Ace" by destroying five German fighter planes in combat. His military awards included the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal plus nine oak-leaf clusters and a Presidential Unit Citation.

He is survived by his wife, Lois, three daughters and eight grandchildren.

He was in Troutdale for the 1996 Troutdale School Reunion. Most recently he sent a photo in uniform for our collection of military portraits. His father, Milo (Mike) Coons, is quoted in our upcoming smelt exhibit in the barn. Mike enjoyed telling how his son buzzed his house when he was flying in the area.


For the record, Sam Cox and Bob Sturges are our only surviving past presidents.

He found a need to bolster a beam there, but building inspectors said we should first take a bunch of sand out from under the east end of the house because it was too close to the beams.

Bob contacted the apartment and building management wing of the Springdale Job Corps training center. Sledges were fashioned out of plastic storage containers and four young people (pictured on Page 2) spent most of two days burrowing under the house to drag out excess dirt. While they were on the property, they also installed insulation in the attic of the barn, another wearisome and worrisome task that needed doing.

And Mike Alderson, a city employee who often volunteers after hours for us, is helping to frame in our shop storage area. Val Lantz, who administers the parks divisions, says she will give after-hours volunteer time to supervising work on the Harlow House.
