
Ice Cream Social time:

City budget group approves money

Pending final approval, the Troutdale budget committee agreed to give our society \$23,500 for capital improvements including needed repairs and improvements to the Harlow House, paint, a new roof and heating and cooling system.

The money from motel and hotel taxes relates to tourism and our role in greeting visitors and local history. Our proposal developed from long range planning sessions guided by Pat Brothers who helped the board set goals and a budgets for our projects for the next 5 years.

Marge Schmunk had the depot gleaming and all the museum store stock out and ready to go when the building opened in May. The place looks better than ever.


Breakfast, then some ice cream
