We like to collect the occasional celery tidbit and recently someone clipped a news story about the plant, which started out as celeriac, an aromatic, but bitter bloom of leaves and seeds.

According to Charles Perry from the LA Times-Washington Post Service, European farmers

began breeding big rooted celery varieties in the 16th century. gradually producing long celery ribs that were not bitter because they were



shielded in dirt. By the time the plant came to Troutdale, farmers placed boards alongside the growing celery to keep it white and sweet.

In the American South, celery was so special it was served as a whole head, upright in a special celery glass or vase. Diners dipped pieces of the celery rib in salt and ate them as a delicacy. \clubsuit


