Our Greatest Tresures are Stories From Members

Among the great treasures in our historical society library are the life stories written by our members. As we have learned from the letter of Newt Parsons or our pioneer diaries, there is just no substitute for the first-person account.

Stan Rathman, one of the veterans featured in our interview in November of World War II vets—and wasn't that a great and interesting meeting—sat down and hand wrote his life story, adding pictures and souvenirs and even a copy of our Troutdale Historical Society newsletters.

We arranged to photocopy Rathman's story, which he concluded in 2003 (but intends to finish), and our librarian Jennifer Munson is now entering it into our historical society li-

brary.

Stan went to sea with the Navy Seabees during World War II and even then, was a prolific writer. One of his stories is about correspondence during World War II, a subject we did not touch on in the November interview.

He had a number of "pen-gals" and includes their photos in his story, except that the space for Mary McKuen is blank "because someone stole your picture." Stan wrote.

Of his war-time correspondence, he wrote: "This was my first time away from home so was a little homesick. We had lots to keep us busy, but in the evenings I started writing letters. Of course, I wrote home, but also I wrote all my aunts and uncles, grandma, cousins and school mates, especially girls...and ev-

eryone wrote back. There was one other who wrote. I had never forgotten the little Canadian girl, my puppy love, Mary...I didn't know her address so I just sent it to Mary McKuen, General Delivery, Windygates, Manitoba, Canada. It turned out to be her address and she wrote back...I would get a letter from her about once a week every week. I would answer right a way so that she would answer back. The others would write me but none so faithfully has Mary."

It is an aspect of war time that we tend to forget in these days when we can contact soldiers in Afghanistan and Iraq by email.

Those old letters, too, are treasures. Don't throw any of them away. They are history.

Remembered

Former state senator and legislator **Vern Cook**, Troutdale, died Dec. 6 at the age of 83. Cook was a lifetime member of the Troutdale Historical Society and was granted that honor because of his legal services to our organization inincorporation. He served a total of 24 years in the state House and Senate between 1957 and 1981. He previously served asTroutdale's city attorney. He and his wife lived in the Sandy Dell of Troutdale.

June McGinnis Sherman Nasmyth, Troutdale native

and 2001 member of the year of the Troutdale Historical Society, died Tuesday, Dec. 2 in Newberg at the age of 91. "She was a pillar of the Troutdale Historical Society," said former president David Ripma. June met her second husband, John Nasmyth, at Troutdale a historical society meeting. The two married on Jan. 3, 1989, held their wedding reception at another meeting became frequent travelers on our Troutdale treks. In addition, she and John were major donors to the Troutdale Historical Society barn and gave the society its very first computer

and printer. She was born May 17,1917 in Troutdale to Morris and Gladys (Lumsden) McGinnis.Her grandfather, Horace McGinnis, was a pioneer celgrower in community. Her father, also a celery farmer, was a mayor of Troutdale from 1948 to 1950. Her mother taught most of the children in Troutdale to swim in the Sandy River.

A couple of other deaths deserve notice. **Ernest Swigert** died. A Portland philanthropist and animal lover, who once picked up a wounded possum on the road and took it to a vet, died Dec. 10. He, his brother Henry, and

his sister Nani Warren, once came to our historical society meeting to talk about their family's party in the history of the Sun Dial Ranch, which was owned by their father. They provided us with quite a few documents that helped to tell the story of the ranch and the development of the dike system that protected it from floods. Also dead is 89year-old Ann Sullivan, an Oregonian reporter, who had a soft spot in her heart for historic buildings and wrote often about preservation efforts in of some of the historic buildings in East Multnomah County.


Stan Rathman, Wood Village, and longtime Troutdale resident died Dec. 17, just a few weeks after he and his brother, Vern, were guests for our November historical society meeting, an interview with World War II Veterans. We are grateful to Kim Cook, interviewer, and the

program committee for preserving the stories of these veterans. Stan, 83, died of stomach cancer. His wife, Vorita, died in 2004. He and his family came to Troutdale in 1943 from North Dakota. Stan followed his older brother Wilbur to War, ending up in the U.S. Navy Seabees.

He shipped out of Norfolk, VA., two days before D-Day and was as surprised as anyone that he ended up in the Pacific in Hawaii. After seven months there he spent the rest of the war running a salvage yard on the island of Guam. He really liked the native people there, and his

life story, which he wrote by hand, includes photos of islanders. He got a job with what was then Valberg Lumber after the war and remained on as shipping supervisor and lumber broker for Vanport Manufacturing for 41 years.















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
