# Troutdale Historical Society Presents: Oral History with Vern Rathman

Vern Rathman was pretty much shanghaied to be mayor of Troutdale in 1959.

"They called up one day and asked me if I'd come to the council meeting," he remembers, and therein lies the story he will tell in our interview with the former mayor in front of a live audience at 2 p.m., Sunday, April 18, in Troutdale City Hall.

Rathman, a retired excavating contractor, played his part in Troutdale, as mayor, as builder of a landmark water tower (a legacy that is now underground) as a member of the planning commission and back to the days when he grew up in Troutdale. His comments on his education in Troutdale schools - the most he would ever get—will warm the heart of any taxpayer.

Recently widowed. Rathman and his late wife, Martine, helped found the Windy Whirlers who cut a rug in Troutdale City Hall. His stories are fun memory is on the money. Be there for the interview bv Sharon Nesbit. It will be taped and the DVD will





## **Don Bogh**

Long time member Don Bogh, a Realtor who operated from a little log house on Northeast 182nd Ave., died March 16, at the age of 91. He and his wife, Jo, were regulars at many of our events. Don was born in Ringsted, Iowa, to Christian and Katherine (Kling) Bogh, the youngest of eight children.

Don served his country in the U.S. Air Force during World War II. Don worked in construction before being a longtime real estate broker in the Portland area. Don was deeply involved in politics. He campaigned for John and Robert Kennedy, was a delegate representative at the Democratic National Convention and was on the citizen action committee for the East Portland Police Department and the

Multnomah County Planning Committee.

Don was a Gateway Booster, a member of the Portland Rotary, Elks, Moose and Toastmaster organizations, on the Portland Board of Realtors and was past president of the Danish Brotherhood.

## **Bernard Garthe Brown**

A long ago Troutdale resident, Bernard Garthe Brown, 95, died March 11, 2010. He was born in 1914. His Oregonian obituary recently mentioned, "Everyone who knew him knew he was most fond of the time he spent on the family farm in Troutdale on the Sandy River (now known as Lewis and Clark State Park)". The rest of the obituary notes: He also shared many summers in Warren, Idaho, on Brown Mountain where his father.

Frank H. Brown, spent many years mining for gold.

He attended Troutdale Grade School and graduated from Gresham High School. Shortly after graduating from high school his father died and Garthe, at age 16, proceeded to support his mother, Caroline M. Wagbo Brown, and his sister, Eileen M Brown, who passed in 2003. It was a difficult time in our nation's economy and the hard work in the jobs he took to provide for his family helped him develop his strong work ethic. He wanted so much

to serve his country but was unable to do so due to severe asthma.

He proudly joined the 3C's (Civilian Conservation Corps) and worked in Gold Beach on various forestry projects. After this he started to work for Montgomery Ward's on Vaughn Street. While he was working here he decided to pursue a career in law. He worked days at Ward's and went to night school at the Sherlock Building which later became Northwest School of Law, now Lewis & Clark Law School. He

graduated in 1941. While still working at Ward's and working part time as an attorney, he met the love of his life, Grace L. Stowaser.

In 1943, he joined Robert Jacob and Randall Jones and become a partner in the firm Jacob, Jones and Brown. He married Grace in April 1944 and they lived happily for 64 years until her passing in May 2008. During their marriage they had two children: Robert Stuart who died in January 2003 and Caroline Zona Stutevoss, who survives him.


## Thoughts on the Arch

It was an absolutely grand day when the Centennial Arch went up in Troutdale on March 16. The Gresham Outlook carried a picture of David Ripma, Sheryl Maydew and Terry Huston standing near the arch, with Paula Goldie taking the picture. (Paula is our board member in charge of preparing the items for the time capsule that goes in the arch's base.)

First, the arch project just kept getting bigger every time someone looked at it. So it took the diligence of two mayors and two city councils to keep it running. We also should thank Max and Sheryl Maydew for staying on task to make it work, though the truth is Max had just too much fun building the arch to think of it as work. Paul Thalhofer and Dave Ripma stayed on the project, and Terry Huston set out to seek donations from school children — both grade schools came up with more than a 1,000 apiece — and that proved to be kind of 'insurance' that the arch would be built.

The cry of "It fits," when the center span went into place and the outburst of applause was a real thrill on that day. Rip Caswell's lovely rainbow trout really do have rainbows on them, and, though the arch's wording is aimed at people traveling east, Len Otto ob-

served that after you pass through it eastbound and look in your rearview mirror, "It still reads right." But my favorite comment was from Mark Garber, publisher of the Gresham Outlook, who described the project as bold, and Troutdale as "somewhat eccentric."

I take issue with "somewhat." Troutdale has always marched to a different drummer and held itself to be a unique town. The arch is a grand gesture made in hard times, and a sign of hope for the next century.
