Troutdale Elementary Today

The first Troutdale School, known as the "shake" school, opened around 1855 and served both Troutdale and Fairview. Its location is unknown, but most of those early residents lived where the Sandy river met the Columbia so the school would have been within walking distance.

The coming of the railroad allowed the river area to be abandoned in favor of the higher ground where Troutdale is to-day. In 1868 a new school was built on what is now the West Columbia River Highway.

Those walking to this one-room school would often encounter deer, bear and even mountain lions along the way.

As Troutdale grew the school became over crowded, and so in 1892 a new building was erected on the "Harlow 40," land located at the top of the hillside where the current Troutdale Grade School now sits. It was a two-story, four room building complete with a belfry. 78 students enrolled that year, although average attendance was closer to 45.

Over the next thirty years this building became rickety, drafty and a fire hazard, so in 1926 the current Troutdale Grade

School was built. It

was a modern, sturdy, concrete structure with a full basement, kitchen and an auditorium, but because Troutdale had not grown much during the passing 30 years classroom space was about the same as the old building. In 1933 school lunch cost 3 cents. Eventually, a wartime boom and the absorption of the Cedar School required a 1949 addition of eight new classrooms. A new gym was added in 1955, but by that time the Troutdale School District had been incorporated into the new Reynolds School District #7 so the decision was made to limit further changes to modernization and make plans for an all new supplementary campus on the west side of town. However, Sweetbriar Elementary School would not become a reality until twenty years later in 1975.

Fairview Grade School circa 1890

By 1855 there was enough population in the Fairview-Troutdale area for Fairview to have its own school. It was only a temporary facility that eventually gave way to a new building in 1860 and then to another in 1870. Finally in 1890 the school pictured abvove the right was opened.

Eighteen years later in 1908 the City of Fairview, which was named after a Methodist church in the area, was incorpo-

rated. By 1923 the 1890 school house had become outdated so a new, modern brick structure was built and finally opened in 1925. This building has been since expanded and modernized a number of times, but today still remains in full operation.

Quite unusual for the 1950s, Fairview began fielding grade school tackle football teams. This was before the Pop Warner youth football organizations

of today so the school had considerable difficulty finding other teams to play, but they managed. This program gave East Multnomah County high schools such as Gresham and Parkrose a leg up when it came to having freshmen enter with tackle football experience.

One result of this program was the achievements of Fairview's Bob

Schloredt, who while at Gresham in 1956 was named Oregon's All-State High School Quarterback. He then went on to the University of Washington where he became an All-American and led the Huskies to high National rankings and victories in the Rose Bowl.

Here are some excerps from a letter from longtime Troutdale resident, John Hale, now living in Richford, New York. John was a Reynolds grauduate in the class of 1966

Hi Terry, It is often fun to remember questions from childhood about places and events that one almost experienced, but had to imagine. Life along the Sandy River was one such place for me. I got hints along the way from kindly old folks in the area, people I worked for and contemporaries that had an interest or a memory from someone else...

My family had a small cabin-like house on the eastern river bank about a quarter mile up from Tad's Chicken 'n Dumplings restaurant from 1954-1989. We lived next door to the Schofield family and across the street from the Loucks family. Harold Schofield and I used to fish the river

for shad. I also worked for many years for Ed Burnacci. Ed was a farmer and had a horticultural nursery in Troutdale. He was also one of the last commercial fishermen on the Sandy and fished the smelt runs. He also fished in the Columbia...

I know Ed Burnacci's father cultivated land with mules...As a teenagers, I worked for Ed with a draft horse in the nursery cultivating the row crops of

trees. Ed said I was one of the last people in the state stupid enough to walk behind a horse all day...


So, I wondered also about the old time farming and practices in the area and what it looked like in those three decades between 1930 and 1960 when I came on the scene as a worker. The Fujii family, for example, was the first in the area to use a mechanical berry picker the called the "Iron Wino."






Everyone was yakking so much that they missed out on your tour! Either that, or you successfully dodged us.


