* Call Jack Knight, 666-5178, to help with the signs.


REPORT FROM THE TREASURER...

We thought you'd like to know a few facts about the barn building, how far we've come and what lies ahead before we can open its doors to the public.

Since we first broke ground for the barn back on July 6 of 1988, we have about 3600 labor hours and over \$62,000 invested in the project to date.

Last fall after getting the siding on and painted, making the barn safe from the elements, we stopped for a well earned breather but now it's time to get back to work and overcome the challenges that lie ahead.

ON THE OUTSIDE:

AGRICULTURE MUSEUM

1-The finish trim on all windows and doors PAID and other parts of the barn.

2-Complete the cupola.

PAID

3-Four concrete door pads, outside. Labor & Material \$425

4-Build and install the front sliding door. Labor & Material \$500

THE REALLY BIG CHALLENGES ARE INSIDE:

5-ELECTRICAL: Labor \$7200; Material \$6500 for a total of \$13700

6-PLUMBING: Labor \$1000; Material \$1400 for a total of \$2400

7-INSULATION: (We plan on all volunteer labor) Material \$ 2500

8-DRY WALL: (Sheet rock) Labor & Material \$ 7500

9-HEATING & AIR CONDITIONING: Labor & Material \$ 7800

10-INTERIOR FINISH CARPENTRY WORK: Labor \$3900 (Trim, doors, stairs, cabinets, etc.) Material \$5600 = \$ 9500
