
Munson's Announced As Members of the Year

Homer John Echert Townsend

May 27, 1917-Feb. 25, 2008 Gresham resident Homer John Echert Townsend, 90, died Monday, Feb. 25.

Homer was born May 27, 1917, in Bakersfield, Calif., to Edward Pecos and Louise Green Townsend. He was raised in Troutdale and graduated from Gresham Union

High School. In 1949, he earned his master's degree in educational administration from the University of Oregon, and he completed advanced graduate study at George Peabody College.

He served in the Navy during World War II, rising to the rank of lieutenant commander and earning five service medals and two Bronze Battle Stars. In 1980, he married Alice Rice. Homer worked as a missionary and educator with the Presbyterian Church. He retired in 1977. Homer was also a member of the Cherry Park Presbyterian Church. He was preceded in death by his wife in 2005.

The Bulbs are in!


If you ordered gladiolus bulbs at the Troutdale Birthday Celebration last October, they are here at the Depot.




is \$10.







