



THE HOUSE AT BRIDAL VEIL--THE BOOK AND THE REAL THING ...



As guests of the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist, we meet at 2 p.m., Sunday, April 17, at the home of the sisters at Coopey Falls just east of Bridal Veil.

Our speaker will be Anita Birt, author of "The House and Bridal Veil," which tells the story of the order and their remarkable restoration of an Italian villa in the Columbia River Gorge.

The villa was designed in 1916 by architect Morris Whitehouse for Portland residents Dorothy and Clarence Jacobson. When William and Louise Lawrence

purchased it in 1926, she landscaped the grounds. The nuns bought it in 1975, completing a skillful restoration and bringing new life and vitality to the crumbling structure.

Co. sign on the old Wigton apartments in downtown Troutdale, we had calls from Lois Mitchell, Sam Cox, Ike Handy, David Ripma and Troutdale Police Officer Leon Berg. THE HARD TIMES OF CEDAR SCHOOL PTA...

At one point, the PTA had no money in the treasury and had an outstanding bill of \$1.75. They passed the hat and rounded up \$2 to pay the bill.

REMODELING REVEALS OLD SAUERKRAUT FACTORY SIGN

The picture at right shows how the Federspiel Sauer Kraut Factory looked in the 1920s. The one below shows it as revealed during a remodeling last month.

The building, at the west end of downtown Troutdale, is now used for apartments.

A 1929 Gresham Outlook indicated it was in use as a sauerkraut plant for the previous 15 years and stated that "Blue Ribbon sauer kraut is much in demand in the Portland market and elsewhere."

The business was then owned by M.C. Federspiel and his son, C.J. Federspiel. The plant shipped about 100 tons of sauerkraut annually.




