The DNA of Home

At the apex of a warm summer's evening, just as the sun was beginning to drape itself with an orange hue over the houses and trees, I hiked up the steep incline of 2nd and Harlow to 3rd and Harlow. Busy with the words inside my own mind to distract myself from the intensity of the climb, I was abruptly encompassed by an all too familiar gust of wind and the beckoning sounds of a nearby train horn. Perhaps it was my lack of imagination as a child growing up, but for what I lacked in imaginary friends, I made up for in the friendly familiarity of landmarks and routines around me. They became friendly giants that framed my otherwise small world.



I paused, consumed with the comforting sounds wafting into the halls of my ears. In one single transcendent moment, I felt the DNA of home inside of me. It felt as though Troutdale knew I was home, and was happy to see me.

My family moved to Troutdale in 1995, the year I started kindergarten. We bought a house in Sandee Palisades, one of several neighborhoods in the area. Our home was built in 1979, and boasted an asymmetrical roof that exuded a sense of cool. Only one other house in the neighborhood matched ours, except the design was in reverse. Naturally, I found this very amusing as a child. I absolutely loved our home, even up the point when it became possessed with what our family refers to as "the white thing." Another story for another time.

Growing up in Troutdale felt like living in a land of in-between. Going west for a few miles, you would hit Portland, where you could go see top acts like The Smashing Pumpkins, or N'Synch. You could visit the Art Museum and see Broadway shows at the Keller. There were high end mid-century furniture stores, high end shoe stores, skyscrapers and bridges. Conversely, if you were to go east from our home, you'd essentially turn left and jump right onto the Historic Columbia River Highway and quickly find yourself at the Sandy River, Multnomah Falls, or vast farmlands. We were were never too far from bright city lights, and we were never too far from freshly picked fruit. We were somewhere in-between berry fields and pop-culture.

Even as a child, despite my naivety for many things, I knew that I lived somewhere special.

Attic Treasures

The attic at the Barn Exhibit Hall holds much of the Troutdale Historical Society's collection which is not on exhibit. For instance, we have this beautiful mantle clock (pictured) in the collection that was owned by Lena Sparf Holst. Lena was born in Finland and married Peter Holst about 1897. Peter's first wife had died in 1894, and it appears Lena helped raised his three children.



Peter died from heart issues in 1922, and Lena's occupation in census records is listed as 'housework.' She was admitted to the Multnomah County Farm and Home (now commonly know as Edgefield) in 1943 because of arthritis. At some point, Lena apparently left the County Home, because she returned in early 1947 and was there until her 1953 death when she was 91.

The clock was manufactured by the Wm. L. Gilbert Clock Company of Winstead, Connecticut. This company was in business until 1964, according to Wikipedia.

Sharon Nesbit, in her book *It Could Have Been Carpdale*, wrote, "In 1982, after the closure of Edgefield Manor, two truckloads of artifacts from the old poor farm came to the society."

CoGNA Visit

"This is really well done," commented one visitor on the THS Barn Museum's King of Roads, Byway of the People exhibit. From anyone else, the comment would have made any of us feel good about what we try to show with the King of Roads exhibit. From a member of the Council of Geographic Names Authorities (CoGNA) it made us feel exceptionally good.

The CoGNA group, hosted this year by the Oregon Geographic Names Board (OGNB), is made up of people from all over the United States. Every state has its own geographic names body that reviews suggestions for name changes within its borders. Oregon has its Oregon Geographic Names Board, on which Troutdale's Sharon Nesbit has served for more years than anyone – including Sharon – can remember. (Sharon does remember wanting to be appointed to OGNB...and being so delighted when she was.) If a state board approves a name change, it goes to the U.S. Board on Geographic Names. With every approved name change, maps would have to be changed, after all, a process which takes years.

Counting the hosts from *OGNB*, there were approximately thirty visitors from *CoGNA*. Michigan, Nevada, Maryland, Colorado, Missouri, Minnesota, and many more states were represented.

"You did a really good job with this exhibit," was heard more than once. People left the exhibit wanting to see the real Columbia River Gorge and Historic Highway... but only after posing in front of the Lovers Oak tree on the Harlow House lawn.

Jamie LaCour, who has coordinated events and has developed the Yarn at the Barn event.


Desiree Smith, our volunteer scheduler.

If anyone knows a potential THS Director we could hire, let me or any Board member know.






