Japanese-American Internment 60th Anniversary Remembrance Sun, April 21, 2:00 p.m. Troutdale City Hall

This May will mark the 60th anniversary of the internment of Japanese-Americans during WWII. Local Japanese-Americans were bussed from the Multnomah County fairgrounds to temporary quarters at the Portland stockyards, and then sent to Idaho for the duration of the war. Some immediately joined farm work crews in the area while others went to war, serving the remarkable 442nd in campaigns in Europe. Not all came back to this area after the war. Those who did

found signs in the windows saying, "No Japs."

In honor of Asian-American month, we will interview local Japanese-American citizens about their experiences for one of our video-taped living history interviews. We have invited Kaz Tamura, Kennie Namba, Jim and Kaz Fujii and Ed Fujii to join us.

We will also showcase an exhibition of posters and the yearbook from Minidoka, the internment camp in Idaho where most local Japanese-Americans were sent.

The natural river rock fireplace, Batchelder tile, and beautiful wood décor throughout the home set the mood. Every window overlooks the Columbia River Gorge, and the spectacular view will enhance the experience as you sip your tea in this natural wood and stone beauty.

Clatsop, where the explorers shivered away a cold and hungry winter. Time permitting, we'll see the salt cairn at Seaside and find an ice cream cone on the way home. Milt & Terry Belnap have agreed to take the job of event planning for this year's Ice Cream Social (June 1-2) and Harvest Faire



In Memory of ...

Lorraine Blivens, 80, died March 12. She was a longtime member of our society and a volunteer who partnered with Dorothy Larson to host the Harlow House. Lorraine moved to Corbett in 1953 and volunteered at Vista House many years.

Lawrence Yost, whose death was announce last month, is remembered as a handy guy to have around when it came to mechanical stuff. He even rebuilt his own Caterpillar tractor.

Lola Mariam Lumsden, long-time member who died Feb. 27, at 88 years of age, was buried at Douglass Cemetery. Born to Oscar and Gertie Walin, she graduated from Rockwood Grade School and Gresham High School. She married Homer Lumsden in 1933.

They lived in Troutdale, Gresham and Fairview while raising their family and later moved to Mountain View Golf Course in Boring to enjoy retirement. Lola loved visiting with her friends from a lifetime of living in this area and one time told Sharon Nesbit, "I'm spending all my time running around visiting my friends before they die." She spread a lot of fun in that manner. Her husband, Homer, was a valuable source of information for both the Troutdale and Fairview historical groups. The Lumsdens were members of both Troutdale and Fairview Rockwood Wilkes historical societies and her family suggests donations to either group or Smith Memorial Presbyterian in Fairview.

Harold Bangs died while asleep in his easy chair on Sat., Jan. 5 at the age of 89. He lived an adventurous life. Harold grew up in Portland working as a bicycle delivery messenger, was a dedicated Boy Scout, a Mazama and mountain climber, a member of the CCC at Cape Perpetua near Yachats, worked on Bonneville Dam, was an X-ray technician in North Africa and Italy during World War II and had a life long passion for guns and shooting, though he was never known to kill any living thing. His wife, Eleanor, has moved to a health care facility. Many thanks to Roy Fall, for keeping us in touch. *
