
Dave and Jennifer Munson smile for the camera at our 2011 annual meeting. David Ripma is seated behind them.

of his presentation Jim Urbaniak donated two glacial erratics to THS.



"Building the Columbia River Highway— They Said It Couldn't Be Done," has dozens of photos from scores of sources (including some from Troutdale Historical Society). It is dedicated to the late Clarence Mershon. Peg also follows up on the old road, explaining what happened to landmarks, bridges and road sites after the initial con-

Happy Birthday, Troutdale Historical Society Sharon Nesbit

With our annual meeting coming up April 27, it's a good time to talk about our own history.

We first got together on a bleak February evening, Feb. 28, 1968, in city hall to talk about the prospect of creating a historical society. There was a fanciful notion at the time, that someday, we would like to have the old Harlow House, then occupied by Lee and Mabel Evans, as a museum.

In March of that year we began signing up charter members of the Troutdale Historical Society. Among those still with us after 46 years: Louise Dix, Barbara Lampert, Sharon Nesbit, Irene Simons, Alfred Stoeckel, Kay Struckman and Dorothy Sturges.

Our history is recorded in the book, "It Could Have Been Carpdale", and we won't repeat that here, but it is a good time to recall stories that didn't make print.

Jean Holman and I were remembering our former director, the late Ellen Brothers. In those days, the society's office was upstairs in the Harlow House and we made a practice each summer of hanging a bright pot of petunias on the porch, a lovely color accent against the old white house. Ellen, who handled all other emergencies with aplomb, was supposed to water the petunias, but she was not good with plants. "They are so needy," she said. We all had to cover for her to save the life of those petunias.



Bob Kerslake and Fay Davis, both now deceased, lent their considerable skills to building our first museum in in the park in 1976.

We remember our first evening meeting in the Harlow House in the late fall of 1979. We had just moved from our original museum in the park and decided to show off the house. What none of us figured out, was that the Harlow House had no lights in the front room. We were bumbling around in the dark bumping into piles of boxes and artifacts until we could secure a supply of floor lamps.

And the day we paid the mortgage off on the Harlow House, Sadie Riley made real estate type signs to post all over the lawn saying: "Paid For". We remember Burns Bros. truck stops coming in at the last minute with \$12,000 to get a roof on our barn before winter. Whew. And the McMenamin brothers showing up to buy Edgefield when it seemed likely we would lose the old poor farm.

We are coming up on the 50th year of our organization, likely with a lot more surprises to

come. Pay your dues. Make a gift to our highway exhibit. Give us some of your time. Or write your own history and get it to us. That's what we're here for.
