Speaking to a near-capacity crowd in Blackberry Hall, Executive Director of the Oregon Coast Alliance, Cameron La Follette illustrated in vivid terms the extirpation over time of sea otters on the Oregon Coast. Hunted for their incredibly luxurious fur, they garnered huge wealth for those who controlled the trade, but by 1911 none were left to hunt. The Elakha Alliance is exploring the possible reintroduction of sea otters to the Oregon coastline. As a keystone species, sea otters would benefit kelp and eelgrass beds, which in turn would provide habitat for marine fish and invertebrates. They also likely would boost local tourism. In case of snow or ice, both facilities will close, prioritizing safety amidst hazardous conditions. Additionally, we've secured a 5200square-foot storage facility at the Masonic Lodge for emergencies like wildfires or flooding. This centralized location, just minutes from our museums, ensures swift accessibility and enhanced artifact protection. These measures reflect our dedication to safety and preservation, reinforcing our commitment to protecting our heritage. We thank our community for their cooperation as we implement these safeguards. We recommend that you create an account with FlashAlert.net where all our closures will be posted. The weather SOP will be available at the office and by request.



Troutdale's Silvery Spectacle: The Smelt Saga







On Friday, March 1st— as though on cue— smelt appeared in the Sandy River in Troutdale.

The small, oily 5"-8" fish swam upriver in droves, while eager riverbank watchers hoped that the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) would open a season for dippers of the silvery fish.

Unlike most anadromous fish, smelt are caught by use of a dip net, with a handle as long as 15'. Tribes welcomed eulachons (smelt) as they represented the first fresh fish since autumn. Meriwether Lewis of Lewis and Clark fame declared of smelt, "...I think them superior to any fish I ever tasted...," and after tasting their first, men of the expedition immediately traded for more. Dried with a wick strung through the center, they burned with a smoky light, earning the name "candlefish."

Later, European settlers dipped them as fertilizer for farm fields. Today, a smelt season is a rarity; since 2010 they are considered a "Threatened Species."

Historically, Troutdale was the only river entirely within Oregon to be blessed with smelt runs. Overnight, the city went from being the 'Gateway to the Gorge' to 'Smelt Central,' with nets for rent sprouting like sunflowers from front yards. People from all over crowded the riverbanks, hoping for their share of the silvery catch. Now, when word goes out that ODFW will allow a season, people line the shore, waiting for the magic hour set as start time. No one wants to be early; state police with their own watches, binoculars to their eyes, scan for violations.

When told of this run, THS Board member Joy Beldin echoed the long-ago words of Lewis, "I love smelt! Any chance you are dipping and could spare a few for me?" Sorry, Joy.

Unveiling Little Bo Peep: A Pitcher Perfect Artifact












A Message from the President of THS
