Cultural Trust to be Voted on in the State House

The Historical Society, as a member of the Oregon Museum Association, is encouraging its members to write to their state legislators encouraging them to vote in favor of House Bills 2923 and 3234. These two bills, if passed, will set up a trust through the secretary of state's office that would fund cultural organizations in the state through three fundings sources: conversion of state assets (real estate held by the state already identified for liquidation), a personal/corporate income tax credit, and vanity license plate sales. Over the next 10 years, these three sources will provide \$218 million in funds that would be distributed throughout the state through the county governments, the Cultural Development Fund and the five Core Partner Agencies to the Trust (the Oregon Arts Commission, Oregon Council for the Humanities, Oregon Heritage Commission, Oregon Historical Society and the State Historic Preservation Office). (THS regularly receives money from the Oregon Heritage Commission.) As a Society member, your handwritten letter is important to con-

vincing your elected officials that funding museums, arts and humanities activities is important to you. If you need more information or need an address for your state representative or senator, please call the society. We appreciate your help in this matter!

I love to get packages in the mail.
