

BACK TO SCHOOL CELEBRATED AT OCT. 20 DINNER AND REUNION

Our first meeting of the fall season will be a potluck dinner and school reunion beginning at 5 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 20, in the Great

REAPING A HARVEST AT HARVEST FAIRE...

At this writing (a day after the Sept. 29 and 30 Harvest Faire) we all are still soaking our aching feet but elated at the profit made at our Harvest Faire and Auction.

Treasurer Marge Schmunk had to take the money to the bank in a shoe box. Thanks to your donations and that of local businesses, our event reaped \$4,749 in the auction, \$1,446 in the flea market and \$1,020 in the food booth for a total of \$7,215.50. The final accounting may vary by \$100 or so, but it is not too soon to say that Harvest Faire was the biggest fundraiser we have ever had.

Thanks must go to event chairwoman Janet Renfro along with Heidi Wilson, organizer of the auction donations and the art contest, and Lynda Harvey who put together two days of pioneer craft demonstrations

at the Harlow House. (Donations there were more than \$250.)

Because this newsletter is short, a complete list of volunteers must wait, but three stars of the performance were Marge Schmunk who ran the flea market and organized the auction, Sadie Riley who ran the food booth and Barbara Welsh who did the decorating. Faithful lieutenants were Dorothy Sturges, Jean Holman and Sharon Nesbit, and a gang of toters and fetchers. (Frank Driver has taken to hiding behind bushes for fear someone will make him haul one more thing around.)

We'll try for a complete list of volunteers next month, but for now a few stories. The crush of hungry people depleted the supplies of Tad's Chicken n' Dumplins. Owner Judy Jones turned up Sunday with the only paper plates she had left, yellow scalloped ones with storks on

them.

The Royal Chinook Inn's smoked salmon was a hit. Our supply of pies gave out an hour before closing time. Sadie Riley's chili was great and the Sandy River Orchards sold more cider than they have ever sold at an event. More than 450 people signed the book at the Harlow House and it is estimated that another 400 didn't bother.
