

REMEMBERING IRENE DOUGLASS WALDO ...

She wore trousers when other women wouldn't have dared. She traveled around the world three times and never ate in a restaurant. She would shake horsetail fern under your nose, tell you to make a tea of it and announce that it was good for your kidneys.

We will remember Irene Douglass Waldo, born in 1893 in Troutdale, died in Portland Feb. 24, at Troutdale Historical Society, Monday,

April 18, 7:30 p.m. in Troutdale City Hall.

We have preserved Dr. Waldo's history in tape recordings and written histories since she first spoke to our society back in 1972. Typically, she requested her remains be sent to the medical school so there was no funeral. Instead we remember her and her part in Troutdale's history. Her daughter-in-law, Lydia Waldo of Linthicum, Maryland, has donated a number of items from the estate. We will have those on display.

HISTORY WRITERS...

History keeps best if it is written down or tape recorded. Words exchanged at our historical society meetings are fun, but they are written on the wind. Two of our members have sat down and written some "tidbits of history" for our files. We will make them part of our permanent records, but we print them for all to enjoy.

MEDICAL PRACTICE IN TROUTDALE by Dr. Frank Packard

Dr. Raymond Mangels lived and practiced in Troutdale from 1932 to 1936 on a full-time basis, and part-time until 1940. In 1936 he formed a partnership with Dr. Robert Greene and established a clinic in the Hollywood district of Portland. Dr. Frank Packard joined the clinic in July 1939 and alternated afternoon hours with Dr. Mangels at the Troutdale office until it closed in 1940.

The office was located next to the beauty parlor in a building that was subsequently replaced by an extension of Handy's service station. The office was simple: a consulting room and examining room, a desk and a few chairs, a table, stethoscope and sphygmomanometer. There was no laboratory, no dispensary. But it was headquarters for a far-ranging general medical practice. The doctors made housecalls all the way from Blue Lake to Crown Point. Simple cases were handled in the office or in the home and serious ones were hospitalized in Portland.

The clientele of the practice was very faithful, and even after the office was closed, many patients followed the doctors to the medical clinic in Portland and contributed much to its growth and development.

One of the fringe benefits of the Troutdale practice was that the medical fees were sometimes partly paid with crates of strawberries

and raspberries, or fresh milk and cream.

The Packards acquired a cabin in Sandy Dell on the river in 1955, an ideal place for recreation, vacations and quick retreats from civilization for the whole family while their three girls were in high school and going on to college. And when retirement time was approcaching, they built their dream house in 1969 where they have lived contentedly in what is now jocularly called, "Packard's Last Resort."

Thank you to Frank Packard for writing his tidbit for us. Next month we will have a reminscence by ROSE JONES CUMMINS about her grandfather, James Austin Jones, a local pioneer.
