#### CITY OF TROUTDALE COMING ATTRACTIONS

Check out the new **Gateway to the Gorge Visitor Center** for its grand opening on **Saturday**, **April 30**. The visitor center is located inside Troutdale's historic rail depot building which dates back to 1907. The building has been lovingly renovated with an eye for detail and will provide a setting for tourists and residents alike to learn more about Troutdale and our region.

A highlight of the space is the stunningly restored Multnomah Falls painting that formerly hung in Council Chambers at old City Hall. This grand piece of Troutdale history was painted more than 100 years ago and stands at 10 feet high and 6 ½ feet wide.

Service - memorabilia on loan from Greg & Sue Handy are on display. The service station was the gathering spot for many Troutdale locals to catch up on the daily news, eat donuts and drink "bad coffee" (as the saying goes). Join us as we gather at the Barn Exhibit Hall for (good) coffee & donuts and catch up on the daily news. The second display is devoted to the historic Smelt Runs. These smelt put Troutdale on the map, if only for a few weeks in the spring anyway. People from miles around would arrive to dip their nets and catch their limit in the Sandy River.

The house has been lovingly preserved by the Troutdale Historical Society since 1979. A temporary display of WWII Nurses' Uniforms are on display. They were donated by Helen Otto and Betty Baldwin, both serving in the US Army Nurses Corps.

It's been more than three years since we closed the Depot Rail Museum. It has been a long wait, but we are finally ready to reopen. We had a "bare-bones" tour last July while the museum was under construction. Come in to see what it looks like now. To see the full extent of the renovation, the displays will be minimal to give you the opportunity to discover what has been revealed - original floors, layers of paint removed from ticket counter, new paint added to match the original paint color and a hidden lock box that was hiding in plain sight.

We now share the building with the brand new Gateway to the Gorge Visitor Center. With their partnership, the Depot will be open five days a week for self-guided and limited docent-guided tours.


Sunday, April 24th

# WORKING LIKE THEY OWN THE PLACE (which they do)

#### **FAVORITES FROM THE ARCHIVE**

Curators **Julia Warner** and **Twila Mysinger** have been hard at work with the inventory at the Harlow House Museum. They are evaluating <u>every</u> item on display to identify and update our museum software database. At times it feels like a treasure hunt or maybe an archaeological dig which unearths some wonderful finds. Here are a few of their favorites.



1926 Candlestick holders of cut glass are 5" high. They were a wedding gift to Sam & Faye Harlow.

No date for this beauty. An ornate metal vanity mirror on a swivel that tilts for the desired angle.



c1922 Universal Electric Toaster, patented in 1915 this dual toaster has a swing out slot for bread. Pop the bread in the swing out slot, then flip to the other side without removing the bread.

Curator **Dee Dee Hansen** spent many hours researching the ins and outs (literally) of the WWII nurses' uniforms that are now on display at the Harlow House Museum. There are uniforms made of wool with matching capes that would keep you warm, but would have been very heavy clothing to wear. There are many dresses on display that had specific uses - crepe casual dresses in several colors; including her favorite "drab" and a seersucker work dress with matching hat. It took a Google search to determine how this hat worked. She's still not sure how it would stay on your head, especially while attending to patients. These uniforms were donated by Troutdale residents Helen Otto and Betty Baldwin. Both served in WWII for the US Army Nurses' Corps.

Helen Otto seen here wearing one of the uniforms we have on display. Helen was the wife of Glenn Otto (Troutdale Mayor and the man the park was named after). She was the mother of five children - Joann, Kenneth, Len, Mary and Neal. She survived the Vanport Flood of 1948 and the Christmas Flood of 1964/65. Helen and Glenn were Charter Members of the Troutdale Historical Society.

## Friends in History Remembered





Betty Cook, Hidden Falls Nature Park, 2019

#### Betty June Tuthill Cook - b. February 14, 1925; d. September 29, 2021

Betty Cook, 96, of Clackamas, died Sept. 29, 2021. Born in Fort Worth, Texas, she graduated from Washington High School in 1943 and entered business school. In 1945 she joined the U.S. Marine Corps and served at Marine Corps Air Station El Toro, near Irvine, Calif. Following discharge, she signed up as a stenographer with the Department of the Army Transportation Division and traveled by Liberty ship to work a year in occupied Tokyo, Japan. Upon her return to Oregon, she met James R. Cook at McElroy's Ballroom. They married in May, 1949. Both used their G.I. Bill benefits to earn their private pilot's licenses. She graduated from Mt. Hood Community College in 1969 and earned her Bachelor and Master's Degrees in education and learning disabilities from Portland State University in 1976. She taught at Adams High School in Portland for 10 years. After retiring from teaching, she worked as a real estate agent for 20 years at Tarbell, Coldwell Banker, and Windemere. In 1995 she helped start the non-profit Senior Computer Learning Center at Lloyd Center. The all-volunteer senior staff taught more than seven-hundred of their fellow senior citizens to use computers. She received an award from the Elders in Action Program for her work.

She was caregiver to her husband, Jim, a volunteer for many years at the Depot Rail Museum in Troutdale, who preceded her in death, Dec. 8, 2013. She is survived by her daughters, Karen Hubbard and Kim Cook of Clackamas (THS Volunteer); son-in-law, Gordon Hubbard; granddaughters, Sabrina and Jennifer; and great-grandchildren, Caleb, Justin, Joshua, Ian, and Melina.

#### Jean Elizabeth McKillop Driver - b. November 15, 1925; d. December 8, 2021

"Jeanie" Driver died in her sleep Dec. 8, 2021 from Alzheimer's Disease. Born Nov. 15, 1925 in Seattle to Stuart and Gertrude McKillop, she attended John Muir Grade School and Franklin High School.

She began nurses' training at Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland, , in 1942 and was a Cadet Nurse during WWII. After the war she met - and subsequently married - Frank Driver who was a maintenance engineer at Good Sam. In 1947 they moved to Springdale. They lived there for 65 years. They had three kids, Stuart, Catherine, Laurie. Jean maintained her RN credentials by working at Good Sam and later doctor's offices. Both she and Frank participated in community activities; (Frank helped work on construction of the Troutdale Historical Society barn) and she was also a sort of "community nurse," giving shots and caring for neighbors. She loved gardening and in their retirement years they started a small daffodil business which gave them an opportunity to travel the U.S. and even to Ireland meeting people from around the world. She has a daf-

fodil named after her. Jeanie, who rarely missed a Troutdale Historical Society trek, was predeceased by her husband, Frank; and their son, Stuart. She is survived by her sister, Mary; and brother, John; plus daughters, Catherine and Laurie; four grandkids and a great-grandson.

#### David Gale Underhill - b. January 5, 1933; d. January 15, 2022

David Gale Underhill, Lieutenant Colonel (USA retired), 89, of Las Vegas, Nevada, died Jan. 15, 2022 after a brief illness. "Gale," as many of his friends called him, was born in Willow, Wisconsin to Lyle Oscar and Carrie Emma Outcalt Underhill. Along with seven siblings, his family moved to Oregon when he was a youth eventually settling in Troutdale, graduating from Gresham High School.

As a teen, he joined the Air Force and after achieving the rank of Staff Sergeant, enlisted in the Army and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel. He had an illustrious career serving as an Army Ranger, eventually specializing in Psychological Warfare becoming the XO of the 7th Psychological Operations Group in Okinawa where he spent more than a decade. As part of his five tours of duty, he also served in Korea and Vietnam.

A highly decorated officer, his awards included the Legion of Merit, the Legion of Merit Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, as well as the Bronze Star. After retirement from the military, Gale settled with his family in Gresham, where he continued his schooling at Portland State University, earning a teaching degree. He taught grade school as a substitute teacher and volunteered at Edgefield Manor for many years. When McMenamins acquired the historic poor farm, they named a room after him.

Gale loved math and his lifetime membership in Mensa. He also enjoyed hunting and fishing, but truly dedicated his life to service and helping others. After retirement from teaching, he went on to tutor kids having trouble in school and didn't charge for his services. He was relentless in his mission to help those struggling with their education.

Gale is survived by his wife, Kazuko, of Las Vegas, whom he met in Okinawa. In addition he is survived by siblings, Marlene Underhill Parker, Damascus, OR, and Kenneth Dale Underhill (wife, Beverly), Rainier, OR; his oldest son, Michael (wife, Michelle), Beaverton, OR; daughter-in-law, Darlene (Bruce) Underhill, Las Vegas; three grandchildren, Thomas and Allyson Underhill, Beaverton, OR, Crystal Taylor; and two great-grandchildren, Kelsey and Kailey. A full military honor service will be held at Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, VA,
