HARVEST FAIRE -- A CELEBRATION OF FALL

This is your invitation to be a part of Harvest Faire, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 24 and 25, at the Harlow House Museum, the Rail Depot Museum and Troutdale Community Park.

What's going on? Frank Grande and his "Slow Possums" will be back to entertain on the park stage, thanks to sponsorship by Reynolds Metals. Also look for a group of line-dancing

children called Country Fun Dancers Too.

Tad's Chicken N' Dumplins will return with great food, we will have homemade pie from our own historical society bakers; Sandy River Orchards will bring their cider press, the blacksmiths of Fort Vancouver and potter Dan Stevens will work in the park, spinners and weavers will ply their yarn at the Harlow House and we're hoping for a special train display at the depot.

What else? A bunch of creative craft workers will have booths in the park. Antique dealers will sell their good old stuff. And Granny's Attic, a sale of collectibles and good old goods from historical society members, will directly benefit the barn. We plan children's activities. The Lions will sell beer. Sadie Riley will do her famous chili. Mary Hughes has promise a washing demonstration at the Harlow House.

A \$1 donation to the barn is suggested to enter the park.

Reynolds Metals is a regular sponsor at Harvest Faire. And Edwin O. Ege Sanitary Service does the same for ice cream social.




