

Barnstorming committee names Tommy Griffin, exhibit designer

Exactly a year ago this newsletter reported that our first barnstorming session -- a committee to brainstorm an exhibit for our museum barn -- had met and come up with 82 ideas for exhibits in the museum.

This group, Chairman Bob Strebin and Len Otto, David Ripma, Dick Jones, Alice Wand, Mike Dubesa and Sharon Nesbit, have experienced a remarkable year. We literally sat down and told Troutdale's history to each other, sorted out the high points of the story -- chapters we call them -- and in the early part of this year, began interviewing designers to help us make sense of our exhibit.

Last month the committee unanimously agreed to contract with Tommy Griffin of Presentation Design Group, a fellow who can teach as well as do. We have isolated about five major chapters and will begin work in July on the first story to be told in the barn.
