## MAY ANNUAL CEMETERY TOUR

This year's Annual Cemetery Tour is set for Saturday, May 19. The bus will depart from the Barn Museum (next to Harlow House) at 9:00 a.m.

Anyone interested in joining this year's tour should bring a sack lunch. We will provide a cooler for cool storage and drinks. At some time during the day we will stop for coffee or a treat. There is no registration for this event, but if you want to make sure we wait for you, please call the THS office at 503-661-2164 and add your name to the list.

Stan Clarke will be out tour guide. He is a member of the state commission on cemeteries and is the best single source in the state of Oregon on historic cemeteries, which he calls "history parks."

The tour will include cemeteries in St. Paul and Champoeg. This is where the first Hudson's Bay trappers chose to settle and it was this community that launched Oregon and the famous Wolf meetings that created the territory. The tour will also include the grave of the only Revolutionary War veteran ever buried in Oregon. The trip will then head north towards Newburg to the St. Paul Rose Garden near the Willamette River where we will likely eat lunch. There are no picnic tables there, so bring a blanket and we will make do. There are restrooms and a nice garden/gift shop. The tour will also include gravesites and tourist center at Champoeg State Park and will plan on being back in Troutdale by 5:00 p.m.

The cost for the tour is a donation towards the rental of the bus.

# Sharon Nesbit talks of Troutdale History and New Book

Troutdale historian, Sharon Nesbit, was the featured speaker at the Troutdale Historical Society's April 15 meeting at Glenn Otto Park. She talked about not only Troutdale history, but the long anticipated new book "It Could Have Been Carpdale, Centennial History of Troutdale, Oregon," due out sometime this summer.

Troutdale actually got its start when between 1891 and 1892 the business community started to emerge on the side of the hill. It was incorporated in 1907 due to the amount of taverns and saloons in the area that needed some "rules and regulations" for their establishments.

Sharon gave a brief explanation of how Troutdale almost became Carpdale due to Captain Harlow's fascination with the fish he had imported from California by steamer at \$5 each. Harlow thought he would get rich selling the fish to the saloons in Portland, that at that time, served free lunches. (Lucky for us, they escaped his pond, got into Beaver Creek, then the Sandy River, but in the process they became the scourge of the entire fishery in the Northwest). He was so sure of his investment he even held a press conference at the port when the fish arrived.

Captain Harlow could have name our city Carpdale, but as Sharon states, "The fact that he died in 1883 before he thought of it is the best news we've had today."

She also told many funny stories about the goings on in Troutdale through the last 100 years, giving much credit to Walt Nasmyth for his memory of growing up in Troutdale. A good many of the stories also involve one of our beloved mayors, Sam Cox.

Sharon's much anticipated book has been a labor of love that she has worked on for at least the last ten years. The book has 11 chapters, and more than 200 photographs. The deadline for pre-sale price of \$34.95 is June 16, 2007. After that time, the price will be \$44.95. - years of continuous service and devotion to preserving history, serving at one time or another in every volunteer position in the society including Secretary, Board Director and Historian
- leading the walking tours, treks and oral history interviews
- her tireless effort on behalf of the Troutdale History and THS
- writing the Troutdale history book, "It Could Have Been Carpdale", which will be published this year for Troutdale's Centennial



### **Evelyn Lewis**

Corbett resident Evelyn Marleen Lewis died on April 21st in Portland at the age of 71.

She was raised and educated in Troutdale and graduated from St. Mary's Academy In Portland in 1954.

Evelyn was a homemaker and enjoyed gardening. She was known for her flower garden along the Crown Point Highway.

She is survived by her children; Carl, Perry, Garth, Casey of Corbett; Greg from St. Petersburg, Fl.; and Stephanie of Happy Valley; her sisters, Lenore of Gresham, Delores of Orient, Lucille of Fairview and Eileen of The Dalles; eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

#### Albert "Mack" Mauck

Troutdale resident Albert "Mack" McClellan Mauck died at home on March 14th.

He joined the Merchant Marines and served during World War II. He was honorably discharged in 1945. Mack moved to East County in 1950 and worked for Goodman Sanitary and Excavation. He also owned Gateway Arabian Horse Ranch, where he bred national and international champion Arabian and half Arabian horses.

He is survived by two sons who grew up in Troutdale, Erik of Boring and Alex of Sandy; and one grandson.

#### Rhea L. Austin

Former Gresham resident Rhea L. Austin died on March 23 in Portland.

She moved to the Portland area in 1947 and then to Gresham. In 1966 Rhea responded to an ad for a wait-ress position at Tad's Chicken N' Dumplings in Troutdale and got the job. She continued as a server there for 29 years through the mid-1990's. She and fellow waitress, Margaret Stitch, were the "queens" of the back dining room and acquired many loyal customers.

When Rhea was 84 she began working as a hostel for Saylor's Old Country Kitchen. She loved cards and was a Life Master at Bridge.

Rhea celebrated her 91st birthday at Tad's in February.

She was preceded in death by her husband Robert and her son Jeff.

She is survived her children; son Robert of Redmond; daughter Judy of Wamic; seven grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

### George Swanson

It has just recently come to our attention that longtime Troutdale resident George Swanson passed away in December of 2005.

George grew up in Troutdale in the house at the base of "Hungry Hill" in the Union Pacific Railroad house in the early 1940's with siblings Melva, Wayne and Elice. The family later moved to Lynchwood for six months and then purchased the Malcolm farm on Halsey Street a half mile east of the "poor farm."

# In Memory

### ~ Walter R. Nasmyth ~

Walter was born in Portland, Oregon on February 8, 1926. He passed away on April 18, 2007 in Clackamas, Oregon.

Walter was the youngest of eight Nasmyth children growing up in Troutdale. He joined the United States Coast Guard at age 16 (after bending the truth about his age) on November 17, 1942. He trained in Port Townsend, Washington and was assigned to the beach patrol in Newport, Oregon. As WWII progressed, Walter was assigned to LST 19 and served in the Mariana Islands, Tinian and Saipan and the Carolines in the South Pacific. He was discharged as a Quartermaster at age 19 in 1945.


On May 10, 1945, Walter married Viola Marie Norton. They had four children, Jackie, Claudia, Christie and Scott. Their daughter Jackie preceded him in death. He is also survived by 12 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

After his discharge, Walter worked as a woodworker and then joined the Portland Fire Bureau. After sustaining an injury he retired from the Fire Bureau in 1965. He then completed his college education and worked for the US Department of Agriculture, retiring in 1988.



Walter was a very active member of the Troutdale Historical Society. He attended all of our monthly program meetings, enjoyed many of the historical treks and served as our photo librarian for the last three years. Every Wednesday Walter and Vi would join Sharon Nesbit in the basement of the Depot and scan and catalogue the historical society's photo collection. In the past three years Walter has scanned and cataloged over 1300 photos. Walter and Vi were Troutdale Historical Society's co-members of the year for 2006.

The last big project Walter did for THS was putting together and organizing the February 2007 meeting which consisted of a photo contest and photo show featuring many of the albums and photos he had catalogued.
