# A berry-picking story to share?

Elizabeth McCallum, associate planner, is new to Troutdale City Hall, but not to Troutdale. She grew up in Parkrose and came to Troutdale every summer to pick berries on the Dix Farm.

She blushes when she tells this one, remembering a dull summer day in about 1965 when she was 13 or 14. Picking was scanty so she "cheated," as almost every picker has done at one time or other, putting rocks in the bottom of her hallocks, and covering them with berries.

Five years later, when she was out of high school and still experiencing remorse over that brief lapse, she mailed Bob and Louise Dix 50 cents.

"I don't know if they ever got it, or if they did, what they made of it," she says.

Her story is a reminder that it is time to start collecting berry-picking stories for our history. Do you have any to share?
